Just Like A Wild Stallion, Mustangs' Brown Never Slows

John Brown opened the track season as the best quarter-miler in the area. He'll finish it as the best halfmiler in the area - and quite possibly in North Caroli-

Only a junior, Brown runs with all the enerby of a wild stallion that doesn't slow down all day. His kick is a thing of beauty, controlled strides rolling back both distance and time in a panorama of power.

The lean 6-1, 153-pounder from Myers Park always starts in lane No. 1 now.

Independence's fleet Jerry Harris broke the sectional 880 record by a full two seconds in 1:56.1 Friday and wasn't anywhere near Brown,

He blazed to an incredible 1:53.5, which charred all challengs and sliced under the state record of 1:53.9. Then Brown led off on the Mustangs' mile relay unit which clocked an equally sensational 3:19.4. Myers Park set the state standard of 3:21.7 a year ago as he led off. However, all state records must be set at the state meet.

"When I came around (the first lap), I knew the pace was good," the softspoken Brown said Saturday. He had an unofficial first lap of 55 seconds. "With about 330 yards to go I started kicking and it was the best inside I've ever felt. I've never felt that way on a half before - - I've never felt that strong.

"I've decided that's (55) what I need to come around in, At East (in the Southwestern 4-A meet) I ran a 58 and then another 50 It seems like

try last fall). We don't have anyone who can take distance workouts any better. He knows how to warm up well. I think he's starting to get the feel of the half now."

Brown, who placed fifth at state in the 400 last year opened this season with a :50.1, but Allen had wanted to try him in the half for quite some time.

"In the quarter you're going to hit boys who have :09.8 speed," Allen explained, "and we're talking about a boy who has :10.4 speed. But John did have a :21.9 split (on a relay 220) in one meet we had. The time he ran 1:55.1 he ran a half mile relay leg and then came back."

Brown knows a lot about running and Allen doesn't believe being out in front will harm the Mustang star.

"He had the very same thing last year," Allen said. "He ruled the roost until we got the end. He realizes at this stage of the game a guy can pop you off."

the prospect is the most tantalizing aspect of the meet scheduled Friday and Saturday at Columbia, S.C.

"The mile could be a great race, as unbelievable race," University of South Carolina coach John West predicts. Maryland's Doha Baker holds the record of 4:04.2.

And the coaches still fan their hopes that somehow Maryland will be stopped from notching only its 16th straight outdoor championship.

The challengers are the Gamecocks. Duke-with high hurdle record holder Jeff Howser and a stable of distance runners-and North Carolina.

Trials will begin Friday and will be followed by the 3,000 meter steelechase final.

Maryland again has a numger of outstanding athletes, including Baker and 16-foot pole vaulter Vince Struble of Raleigh.

However, Baker must battle a couple of brilliant freshmen. Duke's Bob Wheeler has run 4:04.1 while N. C. State's Jim Wilkins' best is 4:05.6.

Brown outdid everyone in county history the first time he tried the 880 this spring, clocking an eye-opening 1:55'.1. The next time out he slashed his best to 1:54.7. Last week he set a Southwestern 4-A

Conference mark of 1:56.4.

"Undoubtedly, he's one of the strongest runners I've ever seen." Myers Park coach Stuart Allen said. "I wanted to give him every advantage there was. I think he spent himself real well on that track last night.

"If he can go out in 55, there are of lot of advantages is that. You run like you feel you want to run. You don't have to chase.

"We've never talked about toing that fast. We've talked about 57, then 56. I think the reason he's healthy is he's
